The Camera Corner . . . Tips for Fall Nature Photography

Create a ghostly silhouette: Think about hanging Spanish moss, or interesting bare branches; any object that's readily identifiable by its shape. Before sunset find a spot with a clear line of sight to the sky with your subject's back to the sun. As the sun is setting, take photos of your subject with the flash turned off. You should have about 20 minutes before the sun is too dark to act as a backdrop. Think about adding to the spookiness by shooting photos with elements of fog!

Low Light Strategies: Many cameras and smartphones have a shooting mode called HDR, for high dynamic range. In this mode, your camera takes two or more shots at different exposures and then combines them so you get detail in the lightest and darkest areas. If there's any movement, the shot will be blurry. It may be the only way to get a shot in very dark situations, especially with a smartphone.

Jack-O-Lanterns: The best time to capture a shot of jack-o-lanterns is at twilight, or 20 minutes after the sun goes down when the glow from the jack-o-lantern produces about the same amount of light as the night sky. With everything equally lit, the camera will have an easy time capturing the details everywhere in your shot. If you miss this 20-minute window, turn on HDR mode. Smartphones should default to HDR in these conditions.

Stage a vignette: Think about combining a candelabra with a jack-olantern, black cat figure, and a colorful chrysanthemum.
